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Synopsis

Three girls out in the dead of night, one-by-one they became separated.

On the evening of September 22, 1998, Scarlett Therese, Gypsy Chu, and Cecilia May venture out for a night of mischief in the coastal town of Blairgowrie. Only two return.

The disappearance sparks one of the most baffling cases in Australia's history: just what happened to 15-year-old Cecilia Lee May?

Years of police work and comprehensive searches result in no sign of the vivacious teenager – and the only suspect has a rock-solid alibi. But the haunting investigation is reopened when human remains are found on a back beach, the bones seemingly washed ashore. 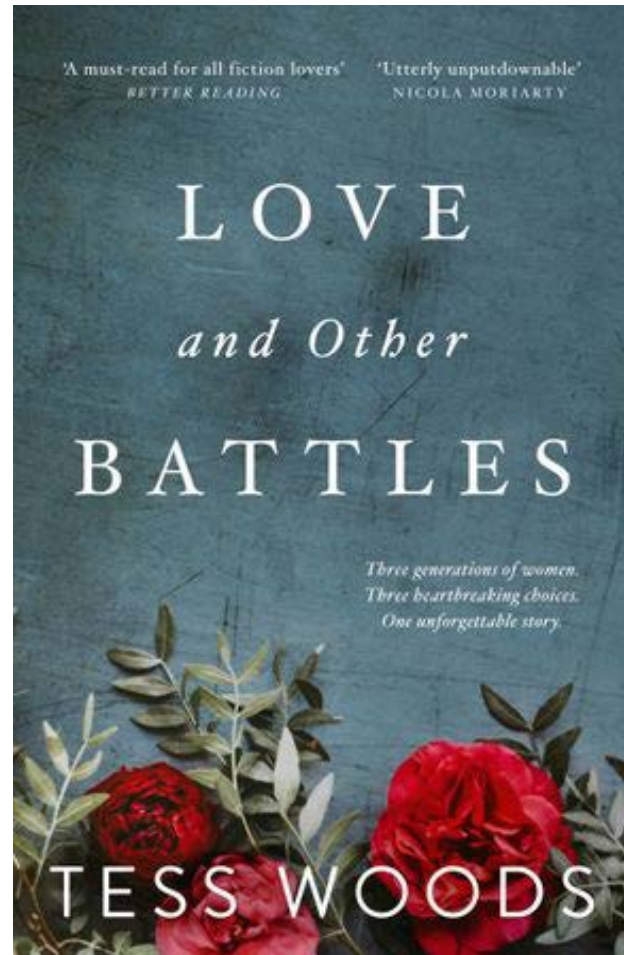
